III. Planning for Improvement

A. Data Analysis/Reflection (ESEA Section 1114(b)(6))

Most Improvement

Which data component showed the most improvement? What new actions did your school take in this area?

Middle School Acceleration (particularly Algebra I) and Grade 3 ELA Achievement demonstrated significant improvement. Middle School Acceleration increased from 79% in 2025 to 100% in 2026, a 21-percentage-point gain. Grade 3 ELA Achievement increased from 57% to 75%, an 18-percentage-point gain, and has improved by 33 percentage points since 2024, when performance was 42%.

Lowest Performance

Which data component showed the lowest performance? Explain the contributing factor(s) to last year's low performance and discuss any trends.

Science Achievement was the lowest accountability component at 67%. Grade-level results show that Grade 5 Science scored 55%, compared with 60% statewide, while Biology scored 81%, compared with 91% statewide. These results indicate a need for stronger mastery of science vocabulary, content standards, and application-based questions. Although science declined from 73% in 2025, it remains significantly higher than the 44% reported in 2024, demonstrating an overall positive three-year trend.

Greatest Decline

Which data component showed the greatest decline from the prior year? Explain the factor(s) that contributed to this decline.

The greatest decline was a tie between Math Learning Gains and Science Achievement, with both decreasing by six percentage points. Math Learning Gains declined from 79% to 73%, despite Math Achievement remaining strong at 90% and all tested math grades performing above the state average. This suggests that some students who were already proficient did not demonstrate enough annual growth to meet the learning-gains criteria. Science Achievement decreased from 73% to 67%, primarily due to the performance of Grade 5 Science and Biology.

Greatest Gap

Which data component had the greatest gap when compared to the state average? Explain the factor(s) that contributed to this gap and any trends.

Among the accountability components, ELA Learning Gains for the Lowest 25th Percentile had the

greatest positive gap compared with the state. The school achieved 86%, compared with the state average of 55%, a 31-percentage-point difference.

EWS Areas of Concern

Reflecting on the EWS data from Part I, identify one or two potential areas of concern.

One area of concern is chronic absenteeism. Thirty students, approximately 16% of the school's enrollment, were absent 10% or more of the school year. The highest numbers were found in Grades 2 and 6.

A second area of concern is ELA proficiency. Thirty-two students were identified as Level 1 on the statewide ELA assessment, with the largest concentration in Grade 2.

Our focus is improving Science instruction in Grade 5 and Grade 8 Biology through stronger standards-based lessons, hands-on learning, academic vocabulary, and regular progress monitoring. This need was identified because overall Science Achievement decreased from 73% to 67%. Grade 5 Science scored 55%, below both the district and state, while Biology scored 81%, also below district and state averages. Strengthening instruction in these areas will help students better understand and apply scientific concepts.

Measurable Outcome

By the end of the 2026–2027 school year, Grade 5 Science proficiency will increase from 55% to at least 65%, and Grade 8 Biology proficiency will increase from 81% to at least 90%, as measured by the Science Statewide Assessments.

The school will monitor implementation and student progress through the District Science Topic Assessments in Performance Matters. Results will be reviewed regularly to identify standards needing additional support, guide reteaching and small-group instruction, and track progress toward the measurable outcomes. As a newly established Project Lead the Way school, we will also use hands-on, project-based learning to strengthen students' understanding and application of science concepts.

Student progress will be monitored continuously using district-provided Science Topic Assessments, prior assessments, and sample test questions. Results will guide reteaching and help identify standards requiring additional support.

Rationale:

These interventions were selected because they are aligned with the Florida science standards and provide consistent, research-based instruction. Regular progress monitoring will help teachers identify learning gaps early, adjust instruction, and provide targeted reteaching to improve Grade 5 Science and Grade 8 Biology proficiency.
